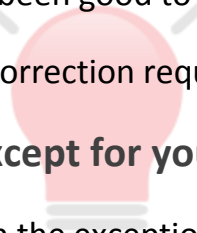

Explanations:

1.

As in the sentence, a comparison between two aspects is given, the underlined part hence must be replaced with 'is better than' to make it a grammatically correct sentence.

Hence, the option B is correct.

2.

The underlined part must be replaced with 'had gathered' to match the tense in the sentence.

3.

The idiom 'in connection with' means 'having to do with a particular thing'.

Ex. The police have questioned many people in connection with the fire in the shopping mall.

While the present participle 'Connecting' means 'to connect with something'.

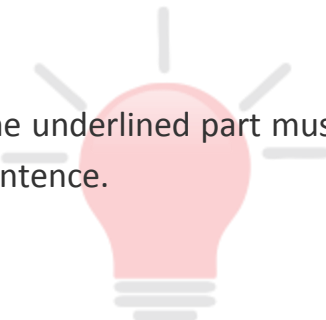
The underlined part, hence, must be replaced with 'connecting' to make it a grammatically correct sentence.

Hence, the option D is correct.

4.

The underlined part must be replaced with the preposition 'because of', which means 'by reason', to make it a grammatically correct sentence.

Hence, the option B is correct.



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5.

Use of the preposition 'Besides', which means 'in addition to something' is not appropriate in the context and must be replaced with the preposition 'despite', which means 'without being affected by or in spite of', to make it a grammatically correct sentence.

Hence, the option A is correct.

6.

The sentence is absolutely correct.

Hence, the option E is correct.

7.

In the context, the underlined part must be replaced with 'wouldn't like to' to make it a grammatically correct sentence.

Hence, the option A is correct.

8.

The underlined part must be replaced with 'is nice to hear' to make it a grammatically correct sentence.

Hence, the option B is correct.

9.

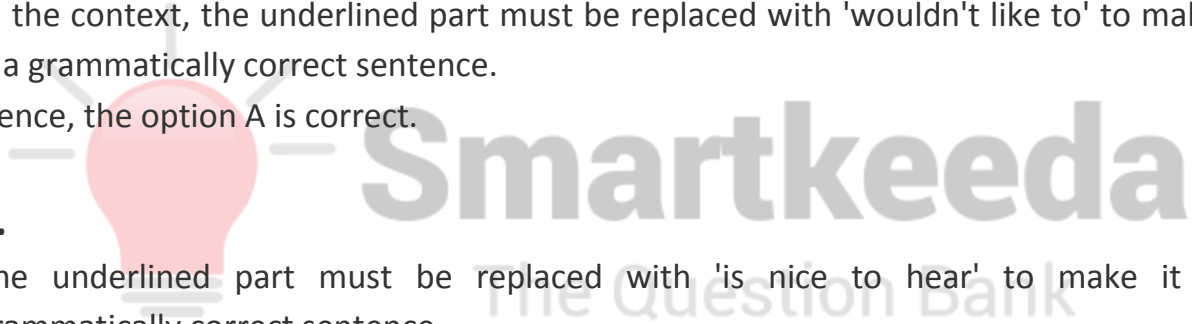
The underlined part must be replaced with 'is good at studies' to make it a grammatically correct sentence.

We use the phrase 'good at' to show someone's efficiency in a particular field.

Ex. He is good at Reasoning.

Ex. Mr. Sharma is quite good at passing the buck.

Hence, the option B is correct.



10.

'Except for' is an idiom which means 'if it were not for'.

Ex. She would travel more except for lack of money.

While 'except' is a preposition which means 'apart from' or 'with the exclusion of' and is followed by a personal pronoun in accusative case (him, me, us, them, etc), if any.

Ex. Everyone went to the party except me.

Ex. All the students wished me good luck except him.

Considering above points, the most appropriate choice is 'except you and me' to make it a grammatically correct sentence.

Hence, the option C is correct.



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
