Explanations:

1.

The underlined part must be replaced with 'Being a realist' to make it a grammatically correct sentence.

Hence, the option B is correct.

2.

The adjective 'liable' means 'at risk of or subject to experiencing or suffering something unpleasant.' and the word is used with 'to'.

Ex. liable to criminal charges; liable to diabetes.

The underlined part, hence, must be replaced with 'liable to' in place of 'able to', the use of which is quite absurd in the context. Hence, the option D is correct.

3.

The underlined part must be replaced with 'either of these two' to make it a grammatically correct sentence.

In this sentence 'either', which means 'the one or the other', is being used as a pronoun.

Ex. Which movie do you want to see? Either will be fine.

Below is the example of 'either' being used as an adjective.

Ex. You can wear either coat.

Hence, the option D is correct.

4.

In the currect sentence, the relative pronoun 'who' is being used for "Shaym' but its antecedent is 'presentation' which is erroneous.

The underlined part, hence must be replaced with 'presentation by Shyam who was' to make it a grammatically correct sentence.

Hence, the option B is correct,.

5.

The sentence is absolutely correct. Hence, the option E is correct.

6.

The underlined part must be replaced with 'dressed to kill' to make it a grammatically correct sentence.

The idiom 'dressed to kill' means 'in fancy or stylish clothes'. (eeda

Ex. Wow, look at Sheena! She's really dressed to kill.

Hence, the option A is correct.'

7.

The underlined part must be replaced with 'off the hook' to make it a grammatically correct sentence.

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The idiom 'off the hook' means 'having avoided a difficult situation'.

Ex. He's just happy to be off the hook on that harassment charge.

Another meaning of the same idiom is 'to get freedom from an obligation'.

Ex. Thanks for getting me off the hook. I didn't want to attend that meeting. Hence, the option A is correct.

8.

The underlined part must be replaced with 'took everyone by surprise' to match the tense in the sentence.

The idiom 'to take someone by surprise' means to do something not expected or to startle or surprise someone.

Ex. His resignation took us all completely by surprise.

Hence, the option D is correct.

9.

The underlined part must be replaced with 'a bit too fast' to make it a grammatically correct sentence.

'To' is a preposition with different meanings in different contexts and is not appropriate here. On the other hand,

'Too' is an adverb, one of the meanings of which is 'more than enough' or 'excessively' and is adding information to another adverb 'fast' in the sentence. Hence, the option D is correct.

10.

The underlined part must be replaced with 'more leisurely life' to make it a grammatically correct sentence.

'Life' is a noun and 'leisurely' is an adjective which means acting, proceeding, or done without haste and in this sentence, it has to add information to the noun following it. Ex. A leisurely trip to Darjeeling.

Ex. A leisurely life in the country with friends and family. Hence, the option A is correct.
